


Much has changed about Holy Family Institute in our nearly 125 years of service to children and families. Our work began in 1900 when three orphaned children were brought to the Sisters' summer home in Emsworth; today, we serve tens of thousands of individuals through a wide range of services, including residential care for migrant youth, specialized education, family-focused programs, and energy assistance.

Over these many decades of service, we have been guided by our faith in God and the belief that every person deserves to feel safe, loved, and respected. It is this perspective that led us to provide shelter to Haitian youth in 2010, after they were removed from their homeland in the aftermath of a devastating earthquake. It was with this same spirit that we opened Nazareth Prep in 2014 to fill the need for affordable, high-quality private Catholic education to propel underserved youth to success in high-demand fields.

Each day, the dedicated staff of Holy Family Institute work to provide help, hope, and healing to children and families throughout Western Pennsylvania. From July 2022 to June 2023, we served 40,911 individuals, including migrant children who were reunited with their families, students who were given the tools to realize their full potential, families who overcame hardship to achieve stability, and households that were able to keep the lights on.

None of this work would be possible without the unwavering support of community members like you. As we look ahead to another year of faithful service to the community, please know that we remain deeply grateful for your generous support. Thank you for ensuring that we have the resources to meet the needs of our clients, students, and community.

Nazareth Prep

Nazareth Prep is an independent Catholic high school serving students of all faiths and backgrounds with a focus on academic excellence and career readiness. Nazareth Prep's STEM- and workforce development-focused curriculum prepares students to become leaders in medicine, education, engineering, manufacturing, and other key regional industries. The school's everyday curriculum integrates crucial college and career readiness skills, such as critical literacy, collaboration, professional writing, strategic innovation, and corporate responsibility.

In conjunction with in-class learning, Nazareth Prep's corporate Internship Program allows students to develop a professional network in careers that interest them while gaining job-specific skills and experience. The program is set up as a work-study program in which students participate in the demands of corporate work, spending one day each week at a regional organization. This experience gives students the advantage – often otherwise unavailable to them – of building professional networks and gaining unique skills to add to a resume or college application.



Specialized Learning

Everyone deserves a second chance, especially children. That's part of the vision at Holy Family Specialized Learning. The other part– problem solving and relationship building–meets second chances at the school doors. For over 30 years, Specialized Learning has been a haven for students across the region, offering a deep culture of understanding to children and their families. Children are referred to Specialized Learning by their home districts when the child's emotional needs outweigh the district's capacity to support them.

Located in Ross Township, Specialized Learning aligns with the greater mission of Holy Family Institute and is led by Senior Director of Specialized Education Services Dr. Carrie Potter-Murray. "Successful education programs are built on the knowledge that children can be successful with the appropriate support and services," Dr. Potter-Murray said. "In short, children do well if they can."

Principal Dale Sleva Jr. echoes this perspective, "Our students come to us with a range of needs. What they need above everything else is a chance. That chance gives them to opportunity to prove them wrong: prove to themselves, their families, their districts, that they can be successful. I remind kids to 'prove them wrong' at least a hundred times a day."

While enrolled at Specialized Learning, students are supported by certified teachers and classroom associates with a 6:1 student-to-staff ratio. Students receive instruction aligned with state standards for their grade level and take enrichment classes including music, art, and physical education. In 2022-2023, Specialized Learning served 137 students.

IMMIGRANT CHILDREN SERVICES



Shelter Program

Since our founding in 1900, Holy Family Institute has cared for the most vulnerable children, including immigrant children in need of care. Today, our Journey of Hope Shelter Program continues this tradition by providing a safe, loving, and nurturing environment for unaccompanied minors awaiting sponsorship in the United States.

Children typically stay at Holy Family for 30 to 45 days before being placed with family members or other qualified sponsors. While they are here, they receive care for all their needs: comfortable housing, nutritious meals, new clothing, and more. In addition, our staff make sure that the children's emotional and developmental needs are met with professional counseling and case management and enriching education and recreation. In 2022-2023, the Shelter Program served 535 children.

Long-Term Foster Care

When there is difficulty locating a suitable sponsor in the United States, some minors may require a longer stay than the 30-45 days provided through our Shelter Program. In these cases, our Long-Term Foster Care program provides a safe and nurturing environment for longer periods of time. Residents live in a home-like setting with around-the-clock care from our highly trained staff.

They attend the local school district-this year, several of them participated in the Avonworth High School soccer team, which advanced to the semi-finals. They participate in religious life-a recent arrival from India practices the Sikh religion, so program staff identified a place of worship and found contacts in the local Sikh community for the minor. Residents also experience Pittsburgh culture, all while learning vital life skills to prepare for a new life in the United States. One minor's family recently arrived in Pittsburgh from Afghanistan. Staff coordinates weekly visits with the family while they search for housing in the area. In 2022-2023, the Long-Term Foster Care program served 40 children.

Home Study & Post-Release Services

What happens after a child is released to their sponsor in the United States? Our Home Study & Post-Release Services staff works to ensure that they are in a safe environment with the best chance at success in their new home. This program expands Holy Family's reach throughout the United States, with regional staff in 16 cities including New York City, Fairfax, San Antonio, and Tacoma.

Our trauma-informed Case Managers develop relationships and help to connect minors and their sponsors to the resources that can help them thrive after reunification. Not only do they ensure the basic safety and stability of the environment, but Case Managers also provide support with legal resources, navigating the education system, gang and substance use prevention, and more. In 2022-2023, Home Study & Post-Release Services served 463 families.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS



Customer Assistance Program

The cost of most things is increasing, and many households spend more than half of their paycheck on housing expenses. Access to reliable utilities is a necessity for anyone, and inability to pay the bills can cause a cascade of other issues. Through the Customer Assistance Program, a collaboration with Duquesne Light, we seek to connect customers with the help they need to ensure their basic needs are met. Holy Family case managers not only facilitate utility assistance for clients, but also seek to understand their unique needs and create a network of resources to help each client achieve stability.

With offices in five high-need communities across the region, including Aliquippa, Beaver Falls, McKeesport, McKees Rocks, and Swissvale, the Customer Assistance Program is accessible to those in need and often serves as an entry point to help clients improve their lives. In collaboration with other community organizations and local governments, case managers provide support for all their clients' needs. In 2022-2023, the Customer Assistance Program served 38,203 households.

In-Home Family Services

A family facing removal of their child by Children Youth and Family Services may feel overwhelmed by the prospect of this traumatic separation. Holy Family's In-Home Family Services works to prevent removal by addressing family challenges.

Each family is referred to the program by their Children Youth and Family Services caseworker. Our In-Home counselors then create a plan to meet the goals and expectations of their caseworker. Counselors teach parenting skills, connect families to outside services and resources, and provide counseling, all in an effort to improve the home life and keep children at home. In 2022-2023, In-Home Family Services served 109 families. **109**

PACT® (Parents and Children Together)

Truancy can have a negative impact not only on a child's education, but also on the entire family. PACT® (Parents and Children Together) works with the entire family to identify and overcome barriers that keep the child out of school. Through collaboration with school districts and magistrate judges, PACT® therapists advocate for their clients and ensure that they are set up for success.

Throughout the 90-day program, families meet with their therapist two times a week and have access to support 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Clients undergo therapy in their own environment and work to build skills that will lead to lasting success in overcoming truancy. In 2022-2023, PACT® served 49 families.



SNAP[®] (Stop Now and Plan)

Early intervention and family participation can make all the difference when dealing with behavioral challenges. SNAP® (Stop Now and Plan) is an award-winning program for children ages 6-11 and their families to work together on improving their interactions.

SNAP® children and parents meet in separate group sessions each week with other families facing similar challenges. Participants learn skills and strategies for managing behaviors and form connections with others in the group. After 13 weeks of group meetings, each parent and child meets with their own caseworker to work toward their individual goals. In 2022-2023, SNAP® served 57 families.





Visit Coaching

It is devastating for a family when children are removed from the home by Children Youth and Family Services and parents can feel helpless to improve the situation and regain custody of their children. Holy Family's Visit Coaching program seeks to provide hope to these families and empower parents to make the most of courtsupervised visitation. Parents meet with a Visit Coach before every visit to plan meaningful and age-appropriate activities. The Coach then observes the visit and leads a debriefing and selfassessment with parents. With caring support, parents learn to prioritize their children's needs and create a stable home environment. In 2022-2023, Visit Coaching served 48 families.



30th Annual Arthur J. Rooney Sr. Courage House Luncheon

Honoring Our Legacy, Investing in Our Future

Nancy Robinson was born and raised in Pittsburgh, attending Catholic elementary school before graduating in 1963 from Mt. Nazareth Academy, a former high school in Ross Township operated by the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth. With the Sisters as role models, Nancy developed a strong sense of compassion and service to the community. The students at Mt. Nazareth did not have frequent interaction with the youth who lived on the Holy Family Institute campus in Emsworth, but Nancy recalls one school dance to which the young residents were invited. The experience left an impression on Nancy, exposing her to peers from a different background than her own and highlighting both the similarities and differences between them.

Nancy is now retired after four decades working at the University of Pittsburgh, and she is still in touch with many of her Mt. Nazareth classmates. In the wake of George Floyd's death in 2020, Nancy joined a book club with several other women to read and learn more about social justice and racial equity. One of these women was former Holy Family Institute Board Member Sister Maria Kruszewski. In their conversations, Sister Maria told Nancy about the work Nazareth Prep, the high school founded by Holy Family in 2014, is doing to close the education-toemployment gap and increase opportunities for students of color. When Nancy learned more about how the organization is working toward equity and opportunity for the community, she knew she wanted to be a part of it. "The work being done at Nazareth Prep is exactly what we need," she said, "helping students reach their full potential and connecting them to people and resources that can help them along the way."

In order to support the mission and vision of Nazareth Prep, Nancy, along with other generous donors like her, chose to maximize her philanthropic impact by including Holy Family Institute in her will. Gifts of this kind ensure that our work can continue to create opportunities for children and families in our community far into the future. While our programming and services may not look the same as they did in 1963, our mission remains the same – empowering students, children, and families.

Remembering Mark Matera's Caring and Devoted Support


